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
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Editor's Note

We wish you a pleasant reading.



History of Quincy Commandery No. 77, KT (Quincy, Illinois)

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Abstract

This study is devoted to the history of one of the active commanderies of the Masonic Order of Knights Templar in the State of Illinois—Quincy Commandery No. 77.

The source base of the research consists of the proceedings of the annual conclaves of the Grand Commandery of Illinois for the period from 1912 to 2023. These materials contain information on changes in the numerical strength of the commandery, the results of official inspections, and other administrative data. The preparation of concise biographical sketches of the members of Quincy Commandery No. 77 relied upon materials drawn from commercial genealogical and biographical databases.

In the conclusion, the author arrives at the following findings.

Quincy Commandery No. 77, located in Quincy, Illinois, was established in 1912 through the consolidation of two local commanderies, namely Beauseant Commandery No. 11 and El-Aksa Commandery No. 55. As a result, at the time of its formation the commandery comprised 135 knights, reaching its peak membership of 179 in 1924.

Over the years of its existence, according to incomplete data, no fewer than 461 individuals passed through the ranks of Quincy Commandery No. 77, 190 of whom remained knights of the commandery until their deaths. Among its membership were three veterans of the American Civil War and at least seven veterans of the First World War. The oldest knight was Past Commander Henry Warren Mead, born in 1830. Other notable members included Past Commander Pressly Alvin Laird, who in 2005 was elected Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Illinois.

In its social and public life, the commandery participated in annual conclaves held both within the State of Illinois and beyond its borders, took part in parades and served as escorts at official functions, and engaged in drill, patriotic, and youth-oriented activities. It also contributed to charitable initiatives sponsored by the Grand Commandery of Illinois.

The study presents concise biographies of 142 knights whose terms of service in the commandery are known and who remained members of Quincy Commandery No. 77 at the time of their deaths. These biographical entries include complete dates of birth and death, places of birth, names of spouses, dates of initiation as Knights Templar, as well as records of advancement and offices held, where applicable. This body of material is of exceptional value for genealogical research.

Historical Background of the City of Quincy, Adams County, Illinois

The future city of Quincy was situated on the Mississippi River. Quincy was granted city status in 1834. During the 1850s, the city experienced significant growth and prosperity owing to steamboat traffic and railroad connections that linked the eastern and western regions of the United States¹. By the early twentieth century, the population of the city had reached approximately 36,000 inhabitants. Quincy attained its maximum population in the 1970s, when it numbered about 45,000 residents, after which a gradual decline began. According to the 2020 census, the population of the city stood at approximately 39,000.

The source base of the present study consists of the proceedings of the annual conclaves of the Grand Commandery of Illinois for the period from 1912 to 2023. These materials contain data on changes in the numerical strength of the commandery, the results of inspections, and other official information. The preparation of concise biographical sketches of the knights of Quincy Commandery No. 77 relied upon materials drawn from commercial genealogical and biographical databases.

The history of our commandery began on 11 January 1912, when a delegation from the Grand Commandery of Illinois arrived in Quincy to establish a new local commandery—Quincy Commandery. It should be recalled that this commandery was created through the merger of two previously existing commanderies in the city, namely Beauseant Commandery No. 11² and El-Aksa Commandery No. 55³.

The former names of the Quincy commanderies were closely associated with the Crusades and Jerusalem. Thus, Beauseant was the name of the military banner of the Knights Templar in the twelfth century, while El-Aksa derived from the name of the Templars' headquarters in Jerusalem during the same period. On this occasion, however, the Templars of Quincy chose to adopt a neutral designation and selected the name of their own city (Fig. 1), resulting in the formation of Quincy Commandery.

As the circumstances were exceptional and the newly established commandery numbered more than one hundred knights, a distinguished delegation of officers of the Grand Commandery of Illinois was present for the constitution of the commandery. The delegation included R.E. Sir Arthur Melvin Otman, Grand Commander; E. Sir Thomas Albert Stevens, Deputy Grand Commander; E. Sir Andrew Jackson Redmond, Grand Generalissimo; E. Sir James McCredie, Grand Captain General; R.E. Sir Alfred Augustus Whipple, Grand Prelate; R.E. Sir John Durham Cleveland, Grand Marshal; and R.E. Sir Edward Starr Mulliner, Grand Recorder⁴. The commandery was constituted in full accordance with established regulations, and its first Eminent Commander was Sir George Milton Reeves⁵.

On 1 March 1912, Quincy Commandery submitted its By-Laws to the Grand Commandery of Illinois for approval⁶.

In the summer of 1912, the commandery elected E. Sir Thomas J. Mackoy as its Recorder⁷. It should be recalled that from 1887 to 1911 E. Sir Thomas J. Mackoy had served as Recorder of Beauseant Commandery No. 11 and possessed considerable experience in this office⁸.

At the 56th Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Illinois, Quincy Commandery was reported as having been Chartered on October 24, 1911, and was assigned Number 77⁹.

In 1912, the membership of the commandery totaled 135 knights. During the year, 3 were Created and 1 Admitted¹⁰. It is important to clarify that each annual report contained two sets of data concerning changes in membership. The first consisted of a statistical table summarizing numerical data for all commanderies within the Grand Commandery. The second comprised detailed commandery-level information, in which the numerical data were fully corroborated.

Those Created were John E. Cadwell, Thomas C. Johnson, and Wilton E. White; the knight Admitted was Robert J. Christie¹¹.

Organizationally, Quincy Commandery was assigned to the Seventh District of the Grand Commandery of Illinois¹².

In 1913, the numerical strength of the commandery remained unchanged at 135 members. During the year, 7 were Created, 4 Dimitted, 1 Suspended, and 2 Deceased¹³.

In 1914, the membership of the commandery increased to 136 members. During the year, 3 were Created, 2 Admitted, 2 Dimitted, and 2 Deceased²¹.

The 1914 Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery was held in the city of Springfield. Fifteen hundred Knights Templar from the Illinois commanderies, representing nearly every major city in the state, took part in the event. In the parade, the city of Quincy was represented by the Fifth Regiment Band of Quincy and Quincy Commandery No. 77²⁵.

Thousands of spectators lined the sidewalks of the city's imposing business district and the adjoining residential areas through which the knightly procession passed, cheering and waving their handkerchiefs. Nine of the finest bands in the state and five drum corps provided musical accompaniment for the parade (Fig. 2)²⁶.

On 22 January 1915, the members of the commandery convened for the election of a Prelate²⁷.

In 1915, the membership of the commandery declined to 132 members. During the year, 4 were Created, 1 Admitted, 6 Dimitted, and 4 Deceased²⁸.

On 28 October 1915, General Orders No. 2 authorized Knights Templar in the State of Illinois to appear in public in uniform for the purpose of visiting other commanderies and fostering strong fraternal bonds among the knights³².

In 1916, the membership of the commandery increased to 135 members. During the year, 9 were Created, 3 Dimitted, 1 Suspended, and 2 Deceased³³.

On 10 May 1916, the Grand Commander granted permission to Quincy Commandery No. 77 to appear in full Templar uniform at the Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Missouri, to be held in Hannibal, Missouri, on 23–24 May 1916³⁷.

In 1917, the membership of the commandery declined to 132 members. During the year, 4 were Created, 1 Admitted, 5 Dimitted, and 3 Deceased³⁸.

In July 1917, Senior Warden Sir Edwin Grant Thompson tendered his resignation. As a result, on 3 August 1917 the Grand Commander granted permission for a special election to fill this office, to be held on 10 August 1917⁴⁴.

In 1918, the membership of the commandery increased to 136 members. During the year, 10 were Created, 1 Admitted, 3 Dimitted, 3 Suspended, and 1 Deceased⁴⁵.

During the years of the First World War, five knights of Quincy Commandery No. 77 served in the armed forces. Their names were John Erie Caldwell, Joseph Addison Smith Ehart, Roseberry Randall, Gilbert Kent Taylor, and Walter Davis Stevenson⁴⁹. Looking ahead, it should be noted that during the economic depression of the 1930s, all of them eventually left the commandery.

In 1919, the membership of the commandery increased to 151 members. During the year, 18 were Created, 3 Admitted, 1 Dimitted, and 5 Deceased⁵⁰.

In 1919, two Illinois commanderies—Rock Island Commandery No. 18 and Quincy Commandery No. 77—submitted invitations to host the Annual Conclave of 1920 in their respective cities. However, the Grand Commander selected Rock Island as the location for the conclave⁵⁴.

In 1920, the membership of the commandery increased to 164 members. During the year, 14 were Created, 1 Admitted, 1 Reinstated, 2 Dimitted, and 1 Deceased⁵⁵.

In 1920, the reporting materials of the Grand Commandery of Illinois introduced a new inspection report form for the commanderies of the state (Table 1). A distinctive feature of this form was that, starting from the Records column through the Ritual column, each aspect of the inspection was evaluated on a 100-point scale, with 100 points being the highest possible score.



As a result of this inspection, Quincy Commandery No. 77 scored 574 points, averaging 95 points per category. Only 17 commanderies out of the 85 in the State of Illinois achieved a higher score⁶⁰. In other words, Quincy Commandery No. 77 ranked among the top 25% of commanderies in the state.

On 20 January 1921, one of the most distinguished Knights Templar, R.E. Sir Edward Starr Mulliner (Fig. 3)—Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Illinois, Past Commander of Beauseant Commandery No. 11, and member of Quincy Commandery No. 77—passed away. In the 1921 Annual Conclave proceedings, a full obituary was published in his memory, which is presented here in its entirety: "Sir Knight Edward Starr Mulliner, R.E. Past Grand Commander

Past Grand Commander Edward Starr Mulliner was born June 26, 1839, in Hillsdale, Michigan. In early manhood he located at Springfield, Illinois. He was educated in the Baptist College at Kalamazoo, Michigan, and in the Illinois State University. In the year 1861, he was employed in the quartermaster's department at Camp Butler, and later engaged in the drug business in Springfield, Illinois, and subsequently in the hardware and housefurnishing business in that city. In 1868, he moved to Quincy, Illinois, where he engaged in the manufacture of sash, doors and blinds, conducting an extensive establishment. In 1881, he organized the Mulliner Box and Planing Company, in which he held the position of secretary, treasurer and superintendent. A few years ago the plant was entirely destroyed by fire, and since that time he had not been engaged in active business, devoting his time largely to the duties of secretary of Quincy Consistory.

He was married to Sylvia J. Conklin of Jackson County, Michigan, May 10, 1865, and to this union two children were born, Walter, who resides in Galesburg, Illinois, and Mrs. Maud Dickinson, of Austin, Texas.

He was dubbed Knight of the Valiant and Magnanimous Order of the Temple in Elwood Commandery No. 6, Springfield, Illinois, and later affiliated with Beauseant Commandery No. 11, and by reason of the merger of the latter commandery with El-Aksa Commandery No. 55, he automatically became a member of Quincy Commandery No. 77. He was elected Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Illinois at its annual conclave held in Chicago, Illinois, on Tuesday, the 25th day of October, 1887, and served until the selection of his successor the following year. He was a member of, and held numerous offices in, many secret societies in which he was actively engaged for a period of time exceeding a half century. For several years preceding his death, he had been gradually failing, and was the victim of those diseases many times attending advanced age. On January 20, 1921, at 11 o'clock a. m., his brave soul winged its way to the land of eternal rest.

Past Grand Commander Mulliner possessed many friends in the community in which he resided. No greater acknowledgment can be made of his worth than to point out that he was the embodiment of all that is comprised within the term, gentleman. His fine character, un flinching honesty, and quiet, pleasing, sincere manner, gave him a distinctive personality. No man ever lived who gave greater thought to his fellowmen or who had more lofty ideals and strove more dutifully to carry them to the utmost. His remains were laid at rest in the cemetery at Quincy, Illinois, by the grand commander, assisted by his corps of officers. Six thirty-third degree Masons officiated as pallbearers, and the officers and every available member of Quincy Commandery No. 77 acted as escort. The vast throng which gathered to pay its last respects, was an eloquent tribute to one who labored so incessantly for the well-being of others.

Memory is never more active nor vision more keen than when we look into the empty space over the grave of a friend. The grassy mound in the quiet acre of the dead becomes a resistless magnet—the voice now silent, a persuasive force which constrains us to live over again the happy past. We listen and hear a faint echo of a song among the stars; we bend the ear and seem to distinguish voices that are hushed in death. Smiling through our tears, we see the sunshine quivering upon the darkness, for just across on the other side, the flowers never fade, and crystal streams murmur incessantly, ever commingling with the song of the bird. No tear dims the vision as boundless beauty breaks in increasing splendor on the view. There is never a cloud to mar the light that makes perpetual morning, and in the contemplation of this grandeur, in the abode of the blessed, we recall the consoling words of our risen Saviour: "I go to prepare a place for you, that where I am, there ye may be also."

Oh, the ineffable victory gained through the Knight Templar's steadfast hope and childlike trust⁶¹.

In 1921, the membership of the commandery increased to 167 members. During the year, 8 were Created, 2 Admitted, 1 Dimitted, and 6 Deceased⁶².

In 1921, based on the results of the inspection, the commandery achieved an average score of 93. The areas identified as most in need of improvement were: Records – 91.4, Manual of Officers – 91.3, Manual of Lines – 88.6, Ritual – 91.4⁶⁶.

In 1922, the membership of the commandery increased to 169 members. During the year, 7 were Created, 2 Admitted, 5 Dimitted, and 2 Deceased⁶⁷.

In 1922, E. Sir Horace Herbert Halliday, Grand Standard Bearer, was appointed Inspector of the Seventh District, which included Quincy Commandery No. 77⁷¹.

During the Easter events of 1922 in Quincy, 36 knights from the commandery took part⁷².

On 8 May 1922, the commandery received permission from the Grand Commander to appear in public in full Templar uniform to visit and collaborate with Excalifor Commandery No. 5, Hannibal, Missouri, on 9 May 1922⁷³.

The 1922 inspection revealed that a substantial portion of the previous year's deficiencies had been addressed, resulting in an average score of 95.2. Scores improved in the following areas: Records – 95, Manual of Officers – 93, Manual of Lines – 91.3, Ritual – 94.4⁷⁴.

At the parade in honor of the 1922 Annual Conclave, 7,000 Knights Templar from across Illinois were present. Quincy Commandery No. 77 participated as part of the Third Division⁷⁵.

In 1923, the membership of the commandery decreased to 167 members. During the year, 4 were Created, 1 Reinstated, 1 Dimitted, and 6 Deceased⁷⁶.

On 9 February 1923, the Grand Commander signed Special Orders No. 4, appointing Sir Knight John Hobbs, Grand Senior Warden, to conduct the 1923 inspection of the commandery⁸⁰.

During the Easter events of 1923 in Quincy, 41 knights from the commandery participated⁸¹.

The 1923 inspection revealed new deficiencies, and the overall score declined to 93.2, slightly higher than two years earlier. Notably, the score for Officers Present, which had usually been 100, dropped sharply to 90, significantly affecting the commandery's overall evaluation⁸².

At the parade in honor of the 1923 Annual Conclave, Quincy Commandery No. 77 participated as part of the Fourth Division⁸³.

On 12 November 1923, Circular No. 2 was issued, announcing that on 5 December 1923, the commandery would hold Grand Commandery Schools sessions⁸⁴.

In 1924, the membership of the commandery increased to 179 members. During the year, 13 were Created, 2 Admitted, 2 Dimitted, and 1 Deceased⁸⁵.

On 5 January 1924, Quincy Commandery received permission from the Grand Commander to appear in full Templar uniform to act as an escort at the installation of officers of Alpha Chapter, O.E.S., on 9 January 1924⁸⁹.

On 7 March 1924, the commandery underwent its annual inspection⁹⁰. As a result, the commandery achieved an average score of 95, a significant increase compared to the previous year, largely due to improvements in Officers Present⁹¹.

On 13–14 May 1924, the commandery visited the Grand Commandery of Missouri and participated in its Annual Conclave at Hannibal, Missouri⁹².

During the Easter events of 1924 in Quincy, 80 knights from the commandery took part⁹³.

On 14 January 1925, the members of Quincy Commandery No. 77 participated as an escort at the installation of officers of Alpha Chapter, O.E.S.⁹⁸.

On 21 January 1925, the commandery members served as an escort at the installation of officers of Henry Root Hill Chapter, Order of DeMolay⁹⁹. The commandery had received permission from the Grand Commander to participate in both events.

During the Easter events of 1925 in Quincy, 61 knights from the commandery took part¹⁰⁰.

The commandery also engaged in charitable activities, donating \$40 toward the L.P. Newby Scholarships for the Boys' School at Rome. In total, the Grand Commandery of Illinois collected over \$4,000 for this purpose in 1925¹⁰¹.

As a result of the 1925 inspection, the commandery's average score declined to 94.3. The decrease was largely due to the Officers Present score, which usually was 100 but fell to 94.7 in 1925¹⁰².

On 29 September 1925, the next annual conclave was held in Chicago. At the parade, Quincy Commandery No. 77 participated as part of the Sixth Division (Fig. 4)¹⁰³.

On 9 December 1925, a school for the members of the Knights Templar was held at the commandery. Seventy-five knights and four Grand Officers participated in the event¹⁰⁵.

In 1926, the membership of the commandery increased to 178 members. During the year, 10 were Created, 3 Admitted, 6 Dimitted, 1 Suspended, and 3 Deceased¹⁰⁶.

On 13 January 1926, Quincy Commandery No. 77 served as an escort to Alpha Chapter, O.E.S.¹¹⁰.

During the Easter events of 1926 in Quincy, 50 knights from the commandery participated¹¹¹.

In 1926, the commandery also took part in the annual conclave held in Peoria. During the parade, the commandery marched as part of the Fifth Division, among a total of up to 7,000 knights¹¹².

The 1926 inspection resulted in the commandery achieving its historical maximum average score of 95.8. The highest scores were recorded in Records – 99.5 and Rehearsal Duties – 99¹¹³.

In 1927, the membership of the commandery declined to 175 members. During the year, 8 were Created, 1 Admitted, 1 Reinstated, 6 Dimitted, 2 Suspended, and 5 Deceased¹¹⁴.

During the Easter events of 1927 in Quincy, 50 knights from the commandery participated¹¹⁸.

The 1927 inspection again resulted in a historical maximum average score of 96.1¹¹⁹. It should be noted that the highest score that year was 98, achieved by only one commandery—Dixon Commandery No. 21¹²⁰. Thus, Quincy Commandery No. 77 once again ranked among the top 25% of commanderies.

In 1927, the commandery also participated in the annual conclave, marching in the Fourth Division during the parade¹²¹.

During 1927–1928, the beginning of the Economic Depression in the United States and the resulting unemployment began to affect the membership of the commandery. Many individuals left their regions in search of work, which led to a decline in the commandery's membership—a trend that would not reverse until after the Second World War.

In 1928, the membership of the commandery increased to 177 members. During the year, 10 were Created, 3 Admitted, 4 Dimitted, 3 Suspended, 1 Deducted for Error, and 5 Deceased¹²².

During the Easter events of 1928 in Quincy, 40 knights from the commandery participated¹²⁶.

The 1928 inspection resulted in a slight decrease in the average score, which fell to 95.3¹²⁷. The primary reason for this decline was the incomplete presence of officers—Officers Present – 94.7.

On 14 November 1928, Alfred Augustus Whipple (Fig. 5) passed away. He had served as Past Grand Commander and Past Commander of El-Aksa Commandery No. 55, and following the merger of the commanderies, he became Past Commander of Quincy Commandery No. 77.

In memory of Alfred Augustus Whipple, the 1929 Annual Conclave proceedings published a full obituary, which we present here in its entirety:

"In Memoriam

Alfred Augustus Whipple

Again death has invaded the ranks of our Grand Commandery and summoned hence a valiant Knight.

Sir Knight Alfred Augustus Whipple, Past Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Illinois, answered the summons of the Supreme Grand Commander and passed from this life on November 14, 1928, at the home of his son Arthur in Benton Harbor, Mich. His death was due to a heart affection with which he had been afflicted for several years.

Sir Knight Whipple was born in Mansfield, N. Y., on October 31, 1845. He attended the public school in Mansfield until the breaking out of the Civil War. His father's enlistment in the Union Army left to the son

the support of the mother and five younger children. The father was taken prisoner in 1863 and died in Andersonville prison during the following year. For seven years he was employed as clerk in the offices of the Erie Railroad Co., at Salamanca, N. Y. It was at this time that he decided upon the practice of medicine as his life work and entered the office of Dr. Henry Learned of Salamanca, later attending the Eclectic Medical Institute, Cincinnati, Ohio, from which he was graduated in January, 1876. Following several years of practice in Western New York, he entered Hahnemann Medical College and Hospital at Chicago, for post graduate work, from which he received his degree in 1880, and during April of that year removed to Quincy, Ill., where he continuously practiced his profession until his retirement during 1927. There were those, however, who had so depended upon him for so many years and who could not accept his retirement. These he continued to serve almost to the time of his leaving Quincy in June, 1928.

Sir Knight Whipple was married to Miss Lydia E. Learned, daughter of Dr. Henry Learned, with whom he studied medicine at Salamanca, N. Y., on October 6, 1869. To this union five children were born. A daughter Grace, died in 1876 at the age of four years, and it was in her memory that Grace Whipple Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star, Quincy, Ill., was named. Four sons survive, Henry of Riverside, Calif.; Merritt of Rochester, N. Y.; Arthur of Benton Harbor, Mich.; and Will of Kearney, Neb. Mrs. Whipple died in July, 1909. In 1911 he was married to Mrs. Emeline Crum, who died June 20, 1927.

Sir Knight Whipple's Masonic career was unusual in that the honors conferred and recognition received came to few men. He was raised a Master Mason April 19, 1868, in Cattaraugus Lodge No. 239 of New York. On April 7, 1882, he affiliated with Quincy Lodge No. 296 which he served as Worshipful Master in 1895-1896, and as Chaplain continuously for fifteen years. Honorary memberships were conferred upon him by Bodley Lodge No. 1, Herman Lodge No. 39, and Lambert Lodge No. 659, all of Quincy.

He received the Capitular Degrees in Olean Chapter No. 150 at Olean, N. Y., May 12, 1871. Later assisted in the forming of Salamanca Chapter, R.A.M., of which he was charter member and its first Principal Sojourner. On November 29, 1881, he affiliated with Quincy Chapter No. 5, and served as High Priest in 1891-1893.

He was appointed Grand Master of the First Veil in 1893, advanced through all offices of the line, and elected Grand High Priest in 1902.

He was greeted a Select Master in Quincy Council No. 15, R. & S. M., on June 11, 1883, and after filling various stations on June 19, 1901, was elected Thrice Illustrious Master, serving for one year.

Sir Knight Whipple was admitted a companion of the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross on August 30, 1882, and created a Knight of the Valiant and Magnanimous Order of the Temple on September 14, 1882, in El-Aksa Commandery No. 55, Quincy, which body he served as Commander during 1897-1898.

His unusual interest and activity in all bodies of Masonry and particularly his devotion to Templarism brought deserved recognition by his election as Grand Warden in 1899. He was successively advanced through the line to his election, on October 24, 1905, as Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Illinois.

He was a charter member and Past Worthy Patron of Grace Whipple Chapter, O.E.S., and an honorary member of Alpha Chapter, O.E.S., both of Quincy.

Sir Knight Whipple received the degrees of the Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite in Quincy Consistory, Valley of Quincy, and was proclaimed a Sublime Prince of the Royal Secret on January 19, 1887. He served the Lodge of Perfection as orator for ten years, 1888-1899, and its Deputy Master 1900-1901; Sovereign Prince 1901-1902; Most Wise Master 1891-1992; Commander in Chief 1894-1896.

He was crowned a Sovereign Grand Inspector General 33rd degree and admitted to Honorary Membership in the Supreme Council, Northern Masonic Jurisdiction, on September 15, 1903.

Doctor Whipple, as he was more familiarly known, so lived and served that he was one of the best known and best loved in the community. In his life were found those personal characteristics, and high integrity, so essential to the successful practice of medicine. Intensely sympathetic and kindly always. Never too weary in mind or body to respond to the call of need. An honor to his profession.

On Saturday, November 17, 1928, the body of Sir Knight Alfred Augustus Whipple lay in state in the Lodge room of the Masonic Temple of Quincy where in the afternoon the funeral service was conducted by his pastor, the Rev. A. S. Chapman of the Vermont Street Methodist Church, followed by the Masonic burial service and interment at Woodlawn Cemetery, in charge of Quincy Lodge No. 296. Quincy Commandery No. 77, attended in a body and formed an escort of honor. The Grand Commandery, Knights Templar of Illinois, was represented by Sir Knight Aubrey Prosser, Grand Commander; Sir Knight David W. Isenhour, Deputy Grand Commander; Sir Knight John D. Cleveland, Past Grand Commander, Sir Knight Edward A. Glad, Past Grand Commander; Sir Knight David Park, Grand Prelate; Sir Knight Carl A. Hallgren, Grand Warden.

"A staunch true friend from us has gone,
A voice we loved is stilled,

A place is vacant in our ranks
That never can be filled""¹²⁸.

In 1929, the membership of the commandery declined to 172 members. During the year, 1 was Created, 1 Admitted, 2 Dimitted, and 5 Deceased¹²⁹.

During the Easter events of 1929 in Quincy, 40 knights from the commandery participated¹³³.




Fig. 6. Form of the Certificate of Excellence¹³⁵

The 1929 inspection resulted in the commandery achieving its highest average score of 96.2¹³⁴. It is important to note that commanderies with an average score of 95 or higher were awarded a Certificate of Excellence. The form of the certificate is shown in Fig. 6. Possessing such a certificate was a mark of prestige, especially for smaller commanderies.

In 1930, the membership of the commandery decreased to 170 members. During the year, 3 were Created, 4 Admitted, 4 Dimitted, 3 Suspended, and 2 Deceased¹³⁷.

During the Easter events of 1930 in Quincy, 62 knights from the commandery participated¹⁴².

In 1930, the Grand Commandery of Illinois expanded the number of factors used to evaluate commanderies during inspections. As a result, whereas in 1929 the average score across the Grand Commandery was 94.8, in 1930 the average fell to 85.1¹⁴³.

Quincy Commandery No. 77 ranked among the 27 best commanderies in the state, each scoring more than 84 points¹⁴⁴.

According to the 1930 inspection, the commandery achieved an average score of 89.4¹⁴⁵, which was the highest among all 84 commanderies in the state. The only other commandery to achieve the same score was Dixon Commandery No. 21¹⁴⁶.

At the annual conclave in Decatur, a delegation of up to 10 members from the commandery participated in the parade as part of the Fifth Division¹⁴⁷. The conclave proceedings also included the first published photograph of the commandery, which is presented here as Fig. 7.

For the good of Masonry, in the Western part of the great State of Illinois, we would sincerely appreciate it if you will come to Quincy and afford us the opportunity of demonstrating to you our hospitality. I have here letters of invitation from all of the Quincy Masonic Bodies, including the four Lodges, the Chapter, the Council, and the Consistory; also from the Mayor and the City Council, the Chamber of Commerce, and a number of outside organizations. I thank you."²⁰²

Sir Knight Stuart E. Pierson, R.E. Past Grand Commander, moved that the courteous invitation of Quincy Commandery No. 77 be accepted. The motion was unanimously carried²⁰³.

At the 1939 annual conclave in Chicago, the commandery's delegation participated in the parade as part of the Third Division²⁰⁴. Notably, the number of divisions in the parade was reduced to three for the first time.

The 1940 and 1941 reports have not been located; however, it is known that the commandery's membership in 1941 was 88 members²⁰⁵. The Eminent Commander in 1940 was Walter E. Thomas, and in 1941 – Everett L. Lawrence²⁰⁶.

In 1942, the membership of the commandery increased to 89 members. During the year, 8 were Created, 1 Admitted, 2 Dimitted, 1 Suspended, and 5 Deceased²⁰⁷.

The period of the second renaissance for Quincy Commandery No. 77 ended rather quickly in 1950, after which the membership began to gradually decline. Interestingly, a very similar situation occurred in another small commandery in Illinois – Bethany Commandery No. 28²⁶⁴.

Seven criteria were used: Dues Collection (maximum 10 points), Records and Reports (maximum 10 points), Commandery Activities (maximum 20 points), Full Form Opening (maximum 20 points), Commandery Orders (maximum 5 points), Order of the Temple (maximum 20 points), and Open Inspection (maximum 15 points), for a total of 100 points⁴⁰⁴.

According to the 1981 inspection, the commandery received 47.1 points. The lowest score was in Commandery Activities – 3.6 out of 20, and the highest was in Dues Collection – 9.5 out of 10⁴⁰⁵.

Analyzing Table 2, we can see that from 1912 to the present, at least 461 individuals have been members of Quincy Commandery No. 77. In reality, this number likely exceeds 500, due to incomplete records. The gaps in our data are primarily due to two factors: first, not all volumes of the Grand Commandery of Illinois Annual Conclaves are currently available at the George Washington Masonic Memorial Center; and second, even in the volumes that are available, personal membership information is often missing, particularly from 1966 onward.

While compiling Table 2, we identified several errors in the historical membership records. For example, Gerald M. Finlay is listed in 1915 as both Dimitted and Deceased. Another knight, Carl Buch, appears as Dimitted in both 1926 and 1927. Similarly, Sylvanus I. Bragg is recorded as Created in both 1913 and 1914.

In several entries, we have placed a question mark in the “Year joined / Status changed” column, indicating that the exact year of joining the commandery is unknown. Nevertheless, it is very likely that most of these individuals belonged to Ascalon Commandery No. 49, which was merged into Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1995.

Among family names, the Miller family is the most represented with 6 members, followed by the White and Brown families with 5 members each, and then the Best, Heidbreder, and Johnson families with 4 members each.

Knights who served for more than 50 years in the commandery include: Walter August Heidbreher – 55 years; Donald Corbin Van Hoy – 54 years; Elmer Herbert Miller – 51 years.

Statistical data on membership changes over the 111-year period are presented in Table 3.



Analyzing Table 3, we can see that according to the presented data: in 1912, the commandery had 135 knights; from 1913 onward, 259 knights were Created and another 70 were Admitted. This gives a total of 463, whereas Table 2 lists 461 names. This small discrepancy between Tables 2 and 3 appears acceptable. In addition, at least 134 knights left the commandery, 62 suspended their membership, and no fewer than 190 knights passed away.

Table 3 enabled the compilation of data suitable for visualizing the membership of Quincy Commandery No. 77 over the period from 1912 to 1983. Since membership data from 1984 to 2019 are unavailable, we were unable to include this information in Chart 1. For convenience, these data have been represented in Chart 1.

Chart 1. Membership of Quincy Commandery No. 77, 1912–1983



In Chart 1, we included membership data for Quincy Commandery No. 77 for the period 1912–1983. Here we can observe three peak periods: the first occurred between 1924 and 1926, when membership reached a maximum of 179 knights; the second in 1950, the post-war period, with 118 knights; and the third in 1967, when Delta Commandery No. 48 merged with Quincy Commandery, again reaching 118 knights. Most likely, there was a fourth peak in 1995, when Ascalon Commandery No. 49 from Pittfield joined the commandery.

We also present brief biographical data for members of Quincy Commandery No. 77 who remained affiliated with the organization at the time of their deaths. This list is arranged alphabetically. The biographies include dates of birth and death, place of birth, the name of the spouse (if the knight was married twice, only the first spouse is listed), date of joining the commandery, and positions held. Birth and death dates are given as recorded in official documents or memorials.

Adams, Clat L. (Jul. 19, 1874 – May 10, 1949)

Clat L. Adams was born on July 19, 1874, in Illinois.





John Robert Truss was born on April 27, 1901, in Oklahoma. He was married to Ruth Elizabeth Truss. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1928. He did not hold any officer positions. He dead on December 1, 1972.

Tuffli, Christian Steven (Mar. 31, 1871 – Apr. 7, 1947)

Christian Steven Tuffli was born on March 31, 1871, in Chillicothe, Livingston County, Missouri. He was married to Annie Tuffli. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1918. In 1937, he was elected Captain General. He dead on April 7, 1947.

Uebner, Arthur Scheley (Jul. 7, 1898 – Jan. 5, 1952)

Arthur Scheley Uebner was born on July 7, 1898, in Illinois. He was married to Naomi E. Uebner. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1947. He did not hold any officer positions. He dead on January 5, 1952.

Unglaub, Frank Henry (1869 – 1960)

Frank Henry Unglaub was born in 1869, in Illinois. He was married to Lana D. McPhail. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1925. He did not hold any officer positions. He dead in 1960.

Van Hoy, Donald Corbin (Aug. 6, 1901 – Sep. 6, 1980)
(Past Commander)

Donald Corbin Van Hoy was born on August 6, 1901, in Indiana.
He was married to Helen B. Van Hoy.
He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1926. In 1932, he was elected Commander. Since 1933 – Past Commander.
He died on September 6, 1980.

Volk, William Cornelius (Aug. 14, 1883 – Mar. 25, 1935)

William Cornelius Volk was born on August 14, 1883, in Quincy, Adams County, Illinois.
He was married to Daisy Dean Yeast.
He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions.
He died on March 25, 1935.

Wall, George Albert (Nov. 10, 1875 – Mar. 3, 1925)

George Albert Wall was born on November 10, 1875, in Quincy, Adams County, Illinois.
He was married to Essie Arnold.
He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1919. He did not hold any officer positions.
He died on March 3, 1925.

Walton, Henry Prentiss (Apr. 25, 1832 – Dec. 27, 1915)



Henry Prentiss Walton was born on April 25, 1832, in Fitzwilliam, Cheshire County, New Hampshire.
He was married to Mary J. Walton.
He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions.
He died on December 27, 1915.

Wehmeyer, William Frederick (1851 – Mar. 19, 1928)

He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions.
He died on March 19, 1928.

Wheeler, Delbert Allison (1860 – Apr. 22, 1931)

He was married to Carrie L. Wheeler.
He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1926. He did not hold any officer positions.
He died on April 22, 1931.

(Past Commander)

Williamson, Charles Henry (Sep. 1, 1862 – Jul. 18, 1916)



Charles Henry Williamson was born on September 1, 1862, in Quincy, Adams County, Illinois. He was married to Emily M. Williamson.

He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions. He died on July 18, 1916.

Wilms, Frederick (1843 – June 25, 1921)

Frederick Wilms was born in 1843, in Illinois.

He was married to Anna F. Wilms.

He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions. He died on June 25, 1921.

Winner, Clyde William (Apr. 9, 1892 – Jun. 26, 1962)

Clyde William Winner was born on Apr. 9, 1892, in Carthage, Hancock County, Illinois.

He was married to Annabelle June Winner.

He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1953. He did not hold any officer positions. He died on June 26, 1962.

Winters, Richard McCullough (Jan. 14, 1922 – Oct. 16, 1981)
(Past Commander)

Richard McCullough Winters was born on January 14, 1922, in Quincy, Adams County, Illinois. He was married to Virginia Dorothy Young.

He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1956. In 1960–1961, he was elected Commander. Since 1962 – Past Commander.

He died on October 16, 1981.

Wisherd, Henry Edgar (Oct. 17, 1880 – Jan. 19, 1961)
(Past Commander)

Henry Edgar Wisherd was born on October 17, 1880, in Quincy, Adams County, Illinois. He was married to Grace Emirinthiam Biddle. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1914. In 1923, he was elected Commander. Since 1924 – Past Commander. He died on January 19, 1961.

Wood, Chauncey Higdee (May 9, 1876 – Jun. 9, 1954)

Chauncey Higdee Wood was born on May 9, 1876, in Illinois. He was married to Lillian Mae Wood. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1912. He did not hold any officer positions. He died on June 9, 1954.

Zoller, George (Oct. 27, 1867 – Dec. 16, 1931)

George Zoller was born on October 27, 1867, in Germany. He was married to Martha Wilhelmina Behrensmeyer. He joined Quincy Commandery No. 77 in 1919. He did not hold any officer positions. He died on December 16, 1931.

A total of 142 biographies of the Knights Templar were compiled, of which 36 were Past Commanders, three were Civil War veterans, and two were World War I veterans. The oldest member of the Commandery was Past Commander Henry Warren Mead, who was born in 1830.

Information regarding the officer corps of Quincy Commandery No. 77 is of particular importance for this study. These data have been compiled and are presented in Tables 4–7.

Starting in 1920, the reporting documents ceased to publish personal data for a number of officer positions, which included Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Prelate, Standard Bearer, Sword Bearer, Warder, and Sentinel. As a result, we created a new table that records only the information that continued to be published, namely the positions of Commander, Generalissimo, Captain General, and Recorder.

Among the officer positions of Quincy Commandery No. 77, the Recorder had the lowest turnover. We identified a total of 9 officers who served as Recorder. The longest-serving was P.C. Alfred Haerle Adams, who held the position for over 30 years.

Between 1912 and 2023, based on incomplete data, Quincy Commandery No. 77 had 68 Commanders, of whom 50 held the office for one year, while the others served for two or more years. The record for the longest tenure was held by Sir David G. Lewis, who served as Commander for at least 11 years.

During the study of the history of Quincy Commandery No. 77, only a few individual photographs of Knights in uniform from Quincy were discovered. All of them date back to the time when the Knights served either in Beauseant Commandery No. 11 or El-Aksa Commandery No. 55. No photographs were found for any of the nine officers who served as Recorder of Quincy Commandery No. 77 from 1912 to 2023. Among group photographs, only one image was found, which relates to a parade in 1930 (Fig. 7).

Using historical reconstruction methods, the Museum of the History of the American Knights Templar at Cherkas Global University has recreated the uniform of a Knight-Standard Bearer from Quincy Commandery No. 77, wearing a mid-season cloak (Figs. 9-12).

Figures 9–12 show the official white uniform of the Knights Templar as adopted in the state of Illinois. We can observe the standard Sash, Sword, Badge, Belt, as well as the cloak and the special belt of the standard-bearer. Next to the knight's uniform is the Templar military flag – the Beauseant.

In conclusion, we would like to summarize the results of this study:

Quincy Commandery No. 77 of Quincy, Illinois was founded in 1912 through the merger of two city commanderies, namely Beauseant Commandery No. 11 and El-Aksa Commandery No. 55. As a result, at the time of its founding, the commandery had 135 knights, and at its peak in 1924, it numbered 179 members.

Over its history—and it continues to operate to this day—we can identify four periods when membership reached peak levels: 1924, when the commandery reached its historical maximum; 1950, the post-war peak; and two other peaks associated with the incorporation of other commanderies, namely in 1967 – Delta Commandery No. 48, and in 1995 – Ascalon Commandery No. 49.

Throughout its existence, Quincy Commandery No. 77 had at least 461 members based on incomplete data, 190 of whom remained lifelong members. Among its members were three veterans of the Civil War and at least seven veterans of World War I. The eldest knight was Past Commander Henry Warren Mead, born in 1830. Among other notable members was Past Commander Pressly Alvin Laird, who in 2005 was elected Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Illinois.

In its social life, the commandery participated in annual conclaves in Illinois and beyond, took part in parades and escorts at official events, engaged in drill, patriotic, and youth work, and supported charitable activities initiated by the Grand Commandery of Illinois. The commandery underwent annual inspections and addressed any deficiencies identified.

This work presents brief biographies of 142 knights whose terms of service in the commandery are known and who remained members at the time of their deaths. These biographies include full dates of birth and death, places of birth, names of spouses, dates of induction into the commandery, and records of officer positions if the knight was elected to a post. This material is invaluable for genealogical research.
